Issues in the fundament al rights institutiona I landscape	Overhauled fundamental rights institutional framework: In 2020, the fundamental rights institutional landscape was fully transformed. There has been no equality body since August 2019. A selection process of new membership of the equality body was underway in late 2020. With the adoption and entry into force of the new Law on Private Data Protection in February 2020, and the entry into force of the 2019 Law on Free Access to Public Information , the national data protection supervision authority and the body overseeing free access to public information have been revamped. The Parliament published a three month delayed public call for a new Ombudsperson on 26 November 2020. The lack of transparency in the announcement caused strong critical reactions among CSOs.

Equality and non- discriminati on	First NAP on LGBTI drafted: The work of the Government- established working group for drafting of the first National Action Plan on LGBTI is underway.

Chapter 1. Equality and non-discrimination

1. Legal and policy developments or measures relevant to fostering equality and combating discrimination against older people and against LGBTI people.

The biggest achievement of 2019 in the area of equality and non-discrimination, the adoption of the new Law on Prevention and Protection against Discrimination (ADL) on 16 May 2019, was reversed in 2020. The adoption of the new ADL was of particular importance for LGBTI people, since it explicitly outlawed discrimination on grounds of sexual orientation and gender identity. Age was already an explicitly prohibited ground for discrimination in the old, 2010, law.² The Commissioners of the (then) equality body – the Commission for Protection against Discrimination (CPAD), challenged the constitutionality of the ADL on formal grounds in front of the Constitutional Court. They objected to the fact that the law was voted for a second time in the Parliament, but was not passed with "a majority vote of the total number of Representatives", as required under Article 75 of the 1991 Constitution applicable in such cases of repeated voting. Acting upon the CPAD application, on 28 January 2020, the Constitutional Court decided that the case has merit and proceeded to process it. On 14 May 2020, the Constitutional Court adopted a judgment finding that, as claimed by the CPAD, the ADL was not adopted with the needed majority and annulled the ADL.4

The annulment of the ADL resulted in having only the Constitution and the scattered non-discrimination provisions as the only legal ground for protection against discrimination in place now. The party coalition that won the July 2020 pre-term elections had the prioritising of the adoption of the ADL as one of its election promises. Moreover, at the initiative of several networks of CSOs, political parties were invited to sign a declaration that they would prioritise the adoption of the ADL following the elections; 17 parties signed the declaration. On 4 September 2020, following the establishment of the new government, the new Minister of Labour and Social Policy announced that the MLSP has sent the text of

the ADL to the Government, which is a first step for the law to reach the Parliament.⁶

Following the establishment of the new Parliament composition and the appointment of the new Government, the text of the ADL, as annulled, was proposed to the Parliament for adoption and was passed in October 2020. In November 2020, the Parliament opened the public call for members of the equality body - the Commission for Protection and Prevention against Discrimination. There has been no functioning equality body in the country since August 2019.⁷ CSOs have pressed for a participatory and transparent procedure for selection and appointment of commissioners. However, the parliamentary majority has rejected their proposals, including the proposed amendment to the ADL.8 The public call for members of the equality body was published with a slight delay compared to the timeframe prescribed in the ADL. Several days after the deadline for applications had passed, a public hearing was scheduled for 29th and 30th of December 2020, in the Parliament. There was less than a day between the public hearing and the time when the full applications of the 44 applicants were published on the Parliament website. Some CSOs were invited to the hearing once again less than a day before the hearing and were allowed to ask questions to the candidates. The parliamentary opposition asked of the President of the Commission for Elections and Appointment Issues for an administrative check of the applications in order to ascertain whether the applicants fulfilled the minimum criteria required by the law, especially the ones regarding prior experience – seven years work on human rights issues out of which a minimum of five years' work on equality and non-discrimination issues. However, the issue was deferred for a later stage of the selection process with the explanation that they cannot prevent a candidate from being heard at the hearing, since that would effectively mean eliminating them.⁹ The hearing process was completed on December 30th, 2020. The next steps are to hold a meeting of the Commission in order to discuss the applications and propose to the Parliament a list of applicants to be appointed as commissioners at a plenary vote. 10

The mandate of the Ombudsperson, the head of another relevant institution for equality and non-discrimination, expired in September 2020. With significant delays and no transparency, the public vacancy announcement was opened on November 26th, 2020. CSOs reacted to the secrecy of the announcement, including to the fact that it was not publicised on the website of the Parliament. Only four persons applied, including the candidate announced by one of the position political parties as their candidate. The process did not progress beyond this point by the cut-off date for this report.¹¹

As announced in 2019, 12 the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy (MLSP), as the competent ministry on equality and non-discrimination issues, established a working group for drafting of the first National Action Plan on LGBTI (NAP LGBTI). The NAP LGBTI will have the following priorities: improving the status of the members of the LGBTI community by improving the legal framework; strengthening the capacities of the relevant institutions for protection and promotion of the rights of the members of the LGBTI community; developing specific areas for intervention to promote the rights of members of the LGBTI community such as the areas of health, education, employment, access to rights, housing and culture; and raising community awareness of LGBTI rights and tolerance of diversity. The NAP LGBTI is still in the process of drafting. The public consultation process, originally expected to start in November 2020, is delayed.

The MLSP also provided other support in relation to LGBTI issues. The Ministry continued the financial support of the LGBT Safe House – a project initiated several years ago by the LGBT Centre, part of the civil society in the country. In addition, due to the possible escalation of violence against LGBTI persons in the newly arisen COVID-19 crisis context, the MLSP, together with the "Joint Programme of the European Union and Council of Europe 'Horizontal Facility II' for Western Balkans and Turkey 2019 – 2022", supported the CSO Subversive Front in establishing an S.O.S. line to provide support to LGBTI victims of violence. Aside from these activities, the CSOs working with LGBTI rights have been quite active during the COVID-19 crisis. Activities vary from provision of packages of hygiene products and food, to legal support in cases of violations of human rights.

In addition to LGBTI, the COVID-19 crisis has been a challenging time for the elderly. In fact, one of the issues that raised largest interest in the country during this period was the difference in treatment on grounds of age, which arose because of the introduction of the COVID-19 measures. Namely, special freedom of movement restrictions were introduced for certain age groups. Persons above 67 years of age and below 18 years of age exercised an ever more limited freedom of movement than the general population. Although the curfew hours were changed several times, this decision refers to the period when there was a general prohibition for movement between the hours 19.00h and 05.00h the next day. However, for persons over 67 years of age the ban lasted from 12.00am until 05.00am the next day during weekdays and 11.00am until 05.00am during the weekend. There were limitations also for persons below 18 years of age (the main one being from 19.00pm until 13.00pm the next day during weekdays). This difference in treatment was challenged in front of the Constitutional Court. The Court found merit in the initiative and decided to process it further, considering it was potentially breaching Article 8 (paragraph 1, lines 1, 3 and 11), Article 9 (paragraph 2) and Article 27 of the Constitution, as well as Article 2 of Protocol 4 of the ECHR. However, in the meantime the Government changed the decision, which meant that officially the Constitutional Court proceedings needed to stop. 15

2. Findings and methodology of research, studies or surveys on experiences of discrimination against older people and against LGBTI people.

During the COVID-19 crisis, the National Network against Homophobia and Transphobia conducted the research "The Problems and Needs of Lesbians, Gays, Bisexuals, Transgender and Queer People in Times of Covid-19 in the Republic of North Macedonia". The main component of the research was a survey conducted online, on a random sample of 111 respondents. It focused on the areas "discrimination and access to health services, security and violence, access to employment and worker's rights, and education and access to education". The initial results 17 illuminate several aspects of the particular ways in which LGBTI people have been affected by the COVID-19 crisis. Notwithstanding the generally unimpeded access to healthcare (84.6% report no issue in accessing healthcare in general) and the fact that 60% of the respondents reported having mental health issues related to the COVID-19 crisis, an overwhelming 70.8% of the respondents did not seek professional help. This is largely due to low attribution of seriousness to the situation at hand, experiencing apathy, lack of finances, fear from being exposed to the virus, and previous negative experiences. In relation

to the last point, it is worth noting that, when asked whether they have been discriminated against when trying to access health case, 100% responded affirmatively. There is very little knowledge of the violence-protection services offered by civil society organisations. On the economic side of the COVID-19 crisis, very few respondents know about the economic measures adopted by the government to deal with the crisis.¹⁸

Chapter 2. Racism, xenophobia and related intolerance

1. Legal and policy developments relating to the application of the Racial Equality Directive

The annulment of the ADL in May 2020 and its (re)adoption in October 2020 were the biggest development in relation to the application of the Racial Equality Directive. The ADL transposed fully the Racial Equality Directive and provided for the establishment of a new equality body – Commission for Prevention and Protection against Discrimination.¹⁹ (For more details on this law, see Chapter 1)

2. Legal and policy developments relating to the application of the Framework Decision on Racism and Xenophobia relevant to combating hate speech and hate crime

Developments related to the application of the Framework Decision on Racism and Xenophobia, with a focus on hate speech and hate crime, have largely been focusing on the Roma. These are described in the next chapter. (For more details on this law, see Chapter 3)

Chapter 3. Roma equality and inclusion

1. Measures and developments addressing Roma/Travellers

The 2020 state budget funds for the realization of the Strategy for Roma 2014-2020 were reduced by 34% because of the budget reallocations related to the COVID-19 crisis.²⁰ Civil society organisations have criticised this decision, which, according to them, would further contribute to exacerbating the position of the Roma community in the country.²¹

At the parliamentary elections of July 2020, one Roma woman was elected as a member of parliament. The new government, which took office in September 2020, for the first time in the last 12 years does not include the position of a Minister without portfolio in charge of implementation of the Roma Strategy. The prime minister has appointed a counsellor for Roma inclusion in his team.

Policy and legal measures and developments directly or indirectly addressing Roma/Travellers inclusion

The Law on Unregistered Persons in the Birth Register was adopted in February 2020.²² At its session on May 29, the Government brought a Decree with legal force for the application of the Law on Unregistered Persons in the Birth Register during a state of emergency extending the stipulated deadlines for submission of requests for registration.²³

In addition, the Government has adopted a Draft Law Amending the Law on Social Protection, to enable persons who received a certificate from the special birth register and identification document, in accordance with the Law on Unregistered Persons in the Birth Register, to exercise social protection rights.²⁴

The Ministry for Labour and Social Policy, in cooperation with CSOs, started with the implementation of two EU co-financed projects (IPA II) to improve the sustainable urban development in several Roma settlements.²⁵

The Ministry of Education and Science opened a call for engagement of 35 Roma educational mediators in all primary schools for the academic year 2020/2021²⁶, as foreseen in the Law on primary education.²⁷

The **research** conducted by the civil society organisation HERA - Association for Health Education and Research, ²⁸ based on a phone survey of 195 Roma women at the territory of the capital Skopje, confirmed the existing high unemployment among Roma. 67% of respondents said they do not work anywhere; as many as 68% of the surveyed unemployed Roma women are not registered within the Employment Service Agency. As many as 74% of the respondents claimed to not have enough funds due to interruption of the informal economy or part-time work.

From the multitude of **measures adopted by the Government** for dealing with the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Decree with legal force for application of the Law on Social Protection during a state of emergency²⁹ which enables faster access to the system of social protection and realization of the right to Guaranteed Minimum Assistance, along with a number of additional economic measures have been of increased relevance for socially vulnerable groups. One of the measures was related to support independent artisans, i.e. financial support of 14,500 denars for self-employed, a category quite present in the Roma community.³⁰ In addition, financial support of MKD 7,000 per household was provided to unemployed people or people who are part of the so-called "informal economy",³¹

as well as the "Domestic Payment Voucher"³² for buying products produced in North Macedonia. Last, the government adopted a decree providing for coverage of health services related to diagnosis and treatment of the coronavirus at the expense of the Health Insurance Fund, for uninsured persons, which has also been significant for the Roma community.³³

The European Roma Rights Centre prepared a report on the **human rights abuses perpetrated against Roma during the time of COVID-19** lockdown measures in Europe, including North Macedonia.³⁴ The report first notes the case of a 37-year-old Romani woman who suffered complications, which resulted in the death of her baby in utero, whilst she was waiting for the results of a coronavirus test for more than six hours outside the hospital doors. The Ministry of Health has since confirmed that her results came back negative. Second, the ERRC reports on a group of nine Romani musicians who upon arrival to the country in March were taken to quarantine in army barracks, as opposed to other 190 passengers arriving in the same manner who were allowed to sign statements for self-isolation and to enter the country. To date, the government has not provided any explanation for the different treatment of the Romani musicians. Last, the report also notes cases of police brutality against the Roma during the COVID-19 pandemic. ³⁵

On September 20, a 40-year-old Roma woman from Suto Orizari and her baby who died at the state clinic in Skopje after giving birth by caesarean section were buried.³⁶ Following this event, the Minister of Health announced that the Ministry would equip a gynaecological medical practice in the municipality.³⁷

Chapter 4. Asylum, visas, migration, borders and integration

Extension of residence permits and other authorisations to stay that expired during COVID-19 pandemic measures.

Chapter 5. Information society, privacy and data protection

1. Legal and political initiatives that have been implemented to support access to, and use of, personal data.

The most important legal development is the adoption of a **new** 'Law on Personal Data Protection' on 16 February 2020.³⁸ This law seeks to **harmonise national legislation with the applicable EU legislation** on data protection (particularly Regulation 2016/679). The new national law adopts the EU rules, including definitions with regard to what constitutes personal data, the obligations and authority of the Agency for Data Protection, clarifies and sets obligations for data controllers, provides rules on monitoring the implementation. With the adoption of the new law on data protection, the Agency's status was changed from a Directorate into an Agency.

Impacted by **COVID-19**, the **Personal Data Protection Agency** delayed several planned trainings for data protection officers. More importantly, the **Agency reacted to media's wrongful use of personal data** in a public manner in offering the information of patients infected by the virus. Specifically, on 10 April 2020, the Agency issued a Statement pointing to the wrongful and alleged illegal use of personal data of patients and **filed a criminal charge** against the perpetrator with the Public Prosecutor's office.³⁹

COVID 19 has created specific challenges related to data protection in several sectors; with education, being one of the most affected as teaching was largely transferred online. The Ministry of Education has general information available on the protection of personal data, but no specific information regarding teaching and learning online due to the pandemic with a focus on personal data protection was identified.⁴⁰

Discussions regarding possible regulation of illegal content online took place within the context of Ministry of Finance as a preventive measure for citizens' manipulation of financial data.⁴¹

In 2020, North Macedonia had **early parliamentary elections** and the Personal Data Protection Agency had a number of activities to safeguard and monitor the protection of personal data during the campaigns. In July 2020, the Agency initiated a procedure for **conducting supervision over the legality of the activities** undertaken in the processing of personal data and their protection **by the State Election Commission**, related to the security incidents in the early parliamentary elections in 2020.⁴²

The **Personal Data Protection Agency** has established a series of activities and tasks on supervising the processing of personal data. The 2020 annual plan in terms of fields that will be reviewed includes the following: state institutions (includes state bodies and agencies); financial institutions; organisations in construction, insurance, and trade; the judiciary, local governance and private security bodies.⁴³

Chapter 6. Rights of the child

1. Measures taken during the COVID 19 to ensure the well-being of children living in poverty and the protection of children from violence.

Measures to address the specific vulnerabilities of children living in poverty Governmental measures taken by the decrees with legal force:

With the **Decree with legal force for application of the Law on Child Protection during a state of emergency**, the Government extended the deadlines set in the Law on Child Protection for submitting a request for the right to one-time financial assistance for a new born, the request for realisation/extension of the right to parental allowance for a third/fourth child, as well as for reviewing the attendance condition for payment of the educational allowance for the academic year 2019/2020.⁴⁴

With the Decree with legal force for application of the Law on Social Protection during a state of emergency, materially deprived households as defined in the law were provided assistance in exercising their right to guaranteed minimum assistance for the months of April and May 2020, obtaining a monetary supplement to cover part of the costs for energy consumption, as well as the deadline for reporting any change affecting the exercise of these rights.⁴⁵

With the Decree with legal force for application of the Law on Labour Relations during a state of emergency, the paid maternity leave was extended until the expiration of the temporary measures for protection against spread and prevention of coronavirus COVID-19.⁴⁶ Assistance specifically to young people was provided with

Low-Income Households⁴⁷ and the Decree with Legal Force for Issuing Vouchers for Young People for Digital Skills Training for Improving Their Competitiveness in the Labour Market.⁴⁸

Measures/actions taken by the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy:

Hygiene packages for families living in substandard conditions were distributed to over 400 families living in substandard conditions; ⁴⁹

The MLSP in cooperation with UN Women – the UN Body for Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment and financial support from the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) and the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency - SIDA, provided 1,860 packages with food and hygiene products for 368 single-parent families, beneficiaries of guaranteed minimum assistance, of which the largest percentage (95%) are women; 329 registered victims of domestic violence; and shelters and crisis centres for victims of gender-based violence across the country.⁵⁰

Care for the youngest through a paid educational supplement for a child With the reform of the social assistance introduced in 2019, the number of beneficiaries of the conditional cash benefit program increased from

2,877 to 24,461 children.⁵¹ Specifically during the COVID pandemic, the Government adopted a Decree terminating the requirement for a certificate of regularity for payment of the education supplement for the third and fourth measurement period for the academic year 2019/2020, in order to facilitate the access to these rights.⁵²

Cross-sectoral measure:

The MLSP and the Institute of Public Health issued a **Protocol for prevention and control of COVID-19 in the small group homes**. ⁵³

Local self-government bodies as well as the business community also provided assistance.⁵⁴

Measures to protect children from violence

Measures/actions taken by the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy:

Guide for internet child protection and safety for parents, guardians, caregivers, educators, teachers and for professionals in Centres for social work, especially for educators in small group homes.⁵⁵

There was no increase in the number of staff or special trainings regarding issues related to violence and COVID-19. Similarly, the standard operating procedures for health and social workers to ensure identification and referral of victims of violence during COVID-19 were not revised. All of them followed the regular Government Protocols: Protocol no. 3 on the organisation of working meetings, trainings, courses and seminars⁵⁶, Protocol no. 9 on activities in institutions for care and education of

Ombudsman expressed concerns of the foreseen transfer prior to providing appropriate education and health care services in the facility.⁶¹

Memorandum of Understanding between the State Council for Prevention of Juvenile Delinquency, the national Chamber of Mediators and the Academy for Judges and Public Prosecutors of the Republic of North Macedonia was signed. It regulates the rules of cooperation and coordination, in terms of application of the Law on Justice for Children and the Law on Mediation, increases the knowledge of the judicial authorities and mediators for children, by encouraging actions that lead to avoiding criminal proceedings against children and protecting them against stigmatisation and secondary victimisation.⁶²

Chapter 7. Access to justice including crime victims

1. Victims' Rights Directive

In January 2020, the Government adopted a National Strategy (2020-2025) and Action Plan (2020-2022) for prevention and protection of children against violence.⁶⁴ Like in 2019, the Compensation Fund for Children Victims (established in 2014) for 2020 was set again to MKD 1.000.000,00.⁶⁵

The amendments to the Criminal Procedure Code⁶⁶ and the Law on Justice for Children⁶⁷, as well as the new Law on the Payment of Monetary Compensation to Victims of Criminal Offences⁶⁸ have still not been adopted.

Through the Action "Preventing and Combating Human Trafficking in North Macedonia"⁶⁹ an Analysis of the rights of victims of human trafficking in court procedures⁷⁰ was prepared and 48 legal professionals - judges, prosecutors, lawyers and criminal investigators, have completed a HELP (Human Rights Education for Legal Professionals) anti-trafficking course.⁷¹

The Macedonian Young Lawyers Association (MYLA) has prepared a GAP Analysis of the legislation and practice of victims' rights in the Republic of

North Macedonia with the EU Directive on rights, support and protection of victims of crimes.⁷². The analysis concludes that the legal framework is generally in line with the standards of Victims' Rights Directive and other European standards, which have supremacy of binding international legal acts over the laws as guaranteed by the Constitution. It assesses that the national laws and policies are internally consistent, while most legal acts and documents apply the participatory approach, including through the involvement of CSOs, with certain doubts as to the latter's effective influence on policies. The analysis concludes that there are sufficiently elaborated national strategies, as well as programme and operational documents for their realisation. Weaknesses are identified in national legal provisions that do not fully reflect the standards from the Directive, for example in relation to lack of access of victims of torture to free psychosocial, health or other support. In addition, the analysis highlights practices that undermine the effective exercise of rights, as well as a lack of financial resources and their inadequate planning and use.

2. Violence against women

The COVID-19 pandemic had significant impact on the violence again women and girls, mostly in the delayed realisation of the National Action Plan to Implement the Istanbul Convention (2018-2023).⁷³ This resulted in no progress in the legislation and the system of protection of women and girls victims against violence, as well as a lack of actions in the field of prevention. The draft Law on Prevention and Protection against Violence against Women and Domestic Violence⁷⁴ was proposed in January 2020, but was not adopted as the Assembly dissolved due to the scheduling of early parliamentary elections in April 2020. The Draft-Law was adopted by the Government on the 9th of November 2020⁷⁵ and was submitted to the Assembly.⁷⁶

The MLSP started 2020 off with 11 newly established specialized services for victims of gender-based violence and domestic violence⁷⁷: 2 Shelter centres and 2 Crisis centres (24h-48h) for women victims of GBV and DV and 7 Counselling centres for women and children victims of violence, in 8 regions of the country. The rest of the activities of the MLSP assigned in the NAP scheduled for 2020 and some from 2019 remain delayed.⁷⁸

"Stay at home" is not safe for everyone/ COVID-19 pandemic effect on domestic violence

During the state of emergency, recommendations and government measures were issued to stay at home, limiting movement outside the homes with a curfew for all the citizens of the country. This created a specific situation for women and children, increasing the risk of domestic violence which is something that the civil society organisations alarmed about in the press release published by the National network to end violence on 19th of March 2020⁷⁹, followed by Request for issuing urgent measures for protection of women and children against domestic violence during the state of emergency⁸⁰ on 13th of April 2020. The Government adopted four sets of measures on dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic81 but there were no emergency measures adopted for women victims of violence addressing the specific risks of this particularly vulnerable group. Following the request for urgent measures by the civil society, the Ministry of Interior announced that victims of crime, including victims of domestic violence would not be subject to sanctions if they leave their homes due to violence to seek help in police stations.82 An informative video, flyers and banners were prepared and

published by the MLSP, but the government did not adopt most of the requested urgent measures.⁸³

According to the official records released by Ministry of Interior⁸⁴ in the period between January – June 2020, 6 murders related to domestic violence's were recorded, while in 2019 only two were recorded for the same period. There was no significant increase in the number of criminal acts related to domestic violence in the first half of 2020 (435) compared to 2019(433). However, an increase of 18% was recorded in the number of reports related to domestic violence for the period January – June 2020 (1874), compared to the same period in 2019 (1541). 65% of the victims were women, and the highest number of assaults against women victims were committed by a current or ex-partner.

The MLSP published weekly reports for the months of May and June 2020 with data on newly registered victims of domestic violence. According to these reports, in May 2020⁸⁵ there were 174 (124 women), and in June 2020⁸⁶ there were 253 (176 women) newly registered victims of domestic violence, showing 30% increase in reported cases of domestic violence after the end of the emergency situation in the country. This increase has been considered as an indicator that women victims of domestic violence faced difficulties in reporting during the state of emergency.

The MLSP, together with the National Network to End Violence against Women and Domestic Violence, and with the support of the OSCE Mission to Skopje organised a campaign aimed at preventing domestic violence and protecting victims during the state of emergency brought on by the COVID-

19 pandemic.⁸⁷ The National Network to End Violence against Women and Domestic Violence launched hotlines to provide help and support to victims in the form of free legal aid, psychological counselling and counselling on social protection rights.⁸⁸ The Network criticised the lack of state measures for the victims of violence and proposed a number of measures that could be undertaken during the pandemic and the state of emergency⁸⁹, some of which were adopted.⁹⁰

Chapter 8. Developments in the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

1. CRPD policy & legal developments

Measures for increasing the political participation of people with disabilities

The State Electoral Commission (SEC) put in place measures⁹¹ to assist people with disabilities in realising their right to political participation at the 2020 parliamentary elections, as the electoral legislation overall is not aligned with the CRPD. The SEC measures included: installation of auxiliary ramps at the polling stations (setting up accessible voting pulls, the possibility for people with sensory disabilities to use a Braille template); a free telephone number in an accessible format where people with sensory disabilities could communicate via video call with the SEC.⁹² The SEC certified trainers for the mandatory training of the election bodies (54 in total) including 4 people with disabilities, 3 of which were women with disabilities.⁹³ Out of 21 issued instructions by SEC for the 2020 parliamentary elections, only the instruction for voting of blind people was made in audio format.⁹⁴

Adopted measures for fight with COVID-19 and CRPD

Even in the state of emergency that lasted between 18th March and 23rd of June 2020 in North Macedonia, in addition to the ECHR, the State was obliged to undertake actions and measures under the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD). The CRPD states that "States shall take all necessary measures to ensure the protection and safety of persons with disabilities in situations of risk, including situations of armed conflict, humanitarian emergencies and the occurrence of natural disasters" (Art.

11). Additionally, the Convention calls for international humanitarian law to be read through a human rights-based approach to disability, as well as maintaining the principles of dignity and non-discrimination and legal capacity towards people with disabilities in emergency situations.

The state declaration of emergency resulted with a derogation from the ECHR. By analogy from this derogation and drawing on Article 11 of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD), it is safe to conclude that the state of emergency also meant the country is not in a position to guarantee articles 9, 14, 18, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24 of the CRPD.

The pandemic has exacerbated what was already weak realisation of the CRPD standards in the national legislative framework. In 2018, the CRPD Committee has noted that the country needs to "a) revise its legislation, policies and guidelines to ensure that disaster risk reduction management and humanitarian aid are accessible to and inclusive of persons with disabilities; (b) provide emergency numbers in accessible formats, equipment and emergency and rescue training courses for persons with disabilities". ⁹⁵ In addition, the Committee has on other occasions elaborated on the standards applicable in emergencies, for example, regarding accessibility or equality and non-discrimination, ⁹⁶ but North Macedonia is yet to abide by these standards. Furthermore, there is no knowledge and awareness of CRPD among policy makers, central and local administration and public at large. This results in continuous charity-driven and exclusion-oriented attitudes to persons with disabilities at all levels. ⁹⁷

The primary method of communication of the adopted measures at the beginning of the state of emergency were government press conferences. Following reactions from the CSO Polio Plus – movement against disability, sign language interpretation was included at the press conferences, which was initially not the case. Except for the press conferences, all other information considering the epidemic was not published in accessible formats, including also the COVID 19 specifically developed government websites and emergency numbers. In such circumstances, people with

disabilities have faced challenges in accessing relevant information. As most of the medical facilities are also not accessible, the COVID testing centres have not been an exception.

The State has not taken activities to inform or train all civil staff, rescue and emergency personnel and all potential actors involved in the management of the state of emergency as to the need of the people with disabilities. There have been no activities to adequately inform the disability community and service providers to persons with disabilities in homes or institutions.

The realisation of the right to personal mobility (article 20 of the CRPD), already a matter of concern, was challenged during the COVID-19 crisis as well. In the periods of lockdown, people with disability were not able to obtain send and submit requested documents to the Fund for Health insurance to receive mobility aids and assistive technologies, putting in question the right to independent living for people with disabilities.

The ban for public transport deprived people with disability of adequate public transport to go to hospitals or some institutions. Access to health care, including medication, for persons with disabilities and their families has been further challenged due to the loss of the pre-existing modest services and other issues. People with intellectual and psychosocial disability have been hit the hardest, as their conditions are not recognised as disabilities, but as mental illnesses at the national level, which is also not in line with Article 1 of the CRPD.

As for social support and services, persons with disability reported high level of social isolation, disruption of services and support. 98 Domestic violence, although on the rise due to the pandemic, is not seen as an issue of relevance for persons with disabilities, as shelter centres for victims of domestic violence are generally not accessible for them.

The measures of transferring educational activities online also did not take into consideration the need of children and pupils with disabilities. For example, online educational classes aired on national television were not

adapted for pupils and children with disabilities. In addition, children with disability who were educated in special schools were not targeted by any educational measure during the school year. As a result, the country was not able to guarantee the realisation of the right to education without discrimination and based on equal opportunity, as foreseen in article 24 of the CRPD.

The impact of the governmental measures for tackling the COVID-19 pandemic on the people with disability remains unknown. From the aspect of health policy, there is no available data of the number of affected people with disabilities. In addition, there were no specific activities to protect the institutionally accommodated people with disabilities such as targeted screenings and testing. There is no data available as to the impact of the alleviating economic, financial and social measures adopted on people with disabilities. ⁹⁹

Adopted measures for inclusive education and online education

In July and August 2020, the Ministry for Education adopted two key documents in the field of education. The Concept **for inclusive education**¹⁰⁰ was prepared after the adoption of the Law on Inclusive Education in 2019. The document is not in line with the CRPD provisions by dividing children and pupils with disabilities in different categories and fails to regulate services for support in the educational setting needed by children and pupils with disability. A Medical approach of disability underpins the adopted measures despite government efforts to revise this practice. The **Concept for online/distance education**¹⁰¹ does not incorporate a disability dimension and does not foresee how distance education will be provided for children and youth attending special or regular educational providers. The Ombudsperson confirmed these assessments in the Opinion considering the online education, assessing that "educational institutions were not fully prepared for distance learning, especially in the beginning of the Corona crisis, and at the same time, they are most affected by the

situation students, especially those in rural areas, as are students from socially vulnerable families as well as students with disabilities". ¹⁰²

The State did not organise consultations and has not provided active involvement of Organizations of Persons with disabilities (OPDs) in the process of the development, implementation and monitoring of emergency-related legislation and policies.

2. CRPD monitoring at national level

The team established in the Ombudsman office for monitoring of the CRPD in July 2019, is still not functioning in line with CRPD provisions. The Ombudsman Office has linked this delay with the COVID-19 pandemic and has announced the setting up of a National Monitoring Network under CRPD as a partnership between the Ombudsperson, ODPs and CSOs to enhance disability inclusion by the end of 2020. ¹⁰³

Main reasoning/argumentatio n (max. 500 chars)	The ECtHR acknowledged that there was no dispute by any party that the data constituted 'personal data'. Upon establishing this first important legal step, the ECtHR goes on to examine whether such data is processed lawfully.

Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	The ECtHR held that 'the mere retention and storage of personal data by public authorities is to be regarded as having a direct impact on the private-life interest of the individual concerned, irrespective of whether subsequent use is made of the data' (para. 51). As a result, the ECtHR held that 'the blanket and indiscriminate nature of the powers of retention of the DNA profiles of the applicants, as persons convicted of an offence, coupled with the absence of sufficient safeguards available to the applicants, fails to strike a fair balance between the competing public and private interests'. The ECtHR reasoned that a fair balance must be struck between compelling public interest and the private interest of the party involved. Furthermore, appropriate safeguards were missing and the powers to use personal data were deemed blanket and indiscriminate. In light of these reasons, the ECtHR found that national authorities had failed to strike a fair balance. The case is significant in determining the limits for use of personal data, in this case DNA, in police work and law enforcement procedures. The case reiterates the importance of privacy and limits states action where it constitutes a disproportionate interference with the applicants' right to respect for private life and cannot be regarded as necessary in a democratic society.

Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	Within the national context, this case is unique because the court used the possibility under law to award non-pecuniary damages to the child victim in criminal proceedings. Namely, in criminal cases in the national context, when a non-pecuniary damage is filled by the damaged party – the victim, the criminal court very rarely (or better said - never) decides upon the damage and, instead, advises the victim to initiate a civil lawsuit for the damages. Thus, the key milestone development in this case is the fact that it is the first case in North Macedonia where the defendant has paid the damages to the victim based on a criminal court decision.

The defendant is obliged to pay the property-legal claim within 15 that from the validity of the judgment, contrary to the collection of the property-legal claim as well as the costs of the procedure according to Article 135 paragraph 6 of the LCP to be executed from the money that the defendant were temporarily confiscated and handed over to the Basic Public Prosecutor's Office for Prosecution of Organized Crime and Corruption Skopje, and after the execution of the decision in this part, the remaining amount of the confiscated money of 24,800 euros to be returned to the defendant.

Key facts of the case (max. 500 chars)	The applicant born in 2004 was abandoned at birth and, upon his grandmother's request, was placed in an Orphanage where the Social Welfare Centre was appointed as his guardian. In 2008 the applicant was diagnosed as suffering from a moderate mental disability, the most severe form of physical disability (cerebral palsy), and a speech disability (alalia). In 2008 the applicant's guardian placed him in B. Rehabilitation Institute where he was diagnosed with mental, physical and speech disabilities. He was discharged in 2012 and placed in the Rehabilitation Institute B.B.S. ("the RIBBS"), an open-type state-run institution for people with physical disabilities and no mental disabilities.
Main reasoning/argumentatio n (max. 500 chars)	In 2013, upon a monitoring visit to the institution, the Ombudsperson found that the applicant was tied to his bed by his leg and later that year issued a special report on the situation in the RIBBS. Acting upon the information in the report, in 2014, the Helsinki Committee for Human Rights – a CSO providing free legal aid, submitted a criminal complaint against the director of the RIBBS and other employees for torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment and for ill treatment in the performance of their duties. They argued this on grounds of the fact that the applicant was tied with a rope by the leg which was short enough so that he could not reach the corridor. In addition, he was not provided with the adequate care and treatment he was entitled to, to such an extent that it amounted to complete neglect, which had been compounded by the fact that the RIBBS did not have any qualified personnel that could meet the applicant's needs, which had resulted in his health deteriorating.
Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	The Court found that North Macedonia has violated Article 3 of the ECHR because of the inappropriate placement of the applicant, lack of requisite care and inhuman and degrading treatment.
- C	One of the key issues arising in the case, when assessed in the overall body of ECtHR case law, is in relation to the procedural issue of representation. Namely, the Court allowing the

	HCHR to represent the child. The Court held that the applicant was a "highly vulnerable person who is manifestly incapable of expressing any wishes or views regarding his own needs and interests, let alone wishes and views on whether to pursue any remedies"(para.48), that the child was to be protected from the legal guardian and that the case raises "serious issues under Article 3 of the Convention". Thus, the ECtHR called upon these being exceptional circumstance, and allowed for the representation of the HCHR.

implications of the case (max. 500 chars)	As fort the issue of representation, the ECtHR did not set any clear standard and instead called upon the exceptional circumstances in this case. Thus, the impact of this judgment on future cases is yet to be seen.

	"In the Court's view, and notwithstanding that the authorities, as they held, were not confronted with allegations of wilful ill-treatment, their overall response in investigating the allegations of serious human rights violations, as in the present case, cannot be regarded adequate. The absence of any appropriate reaction, let alone redress, with respect to the events complained of, cannot be said to be compatible with the procedural obligation of the State under Article 3 of the Convention."
